Job Site First Aid Kit Safety



All job sites should have a readily accessible first aid kit equipped to ANSI Z 308.1-2003, the minimal requirements for workplace first aid kits. The ANSI

standards are minimum, and job site first aid kits may need to be supplemented with additional supplies and equipment to handle severe injuries, injuries to multiple patients or CPR on multiple victims simultaneously. Review these first aid kit safety tips with your employees.

Tool Box Tips

FIRST AID KIT BEST PRACTICES

- · First aid kits must be made accessible to all employees.
- · Inventory first aid kits regularly to ensure emergency supplies are ready.
- · Consider first aid kits or bags that are portable.
- · First aid kits should never be kept behind locked doors.
- Employees on the job site must know the locations of first aid kits.
- Post job site first aid responder contact information so employees know how to contact them in case of an emergency.
- · Provide an accessible phone that dials out to 911.

MOUNT KITS IN THESE LOCATIONS:

- · Work trucks and company cars.
- · Job site work trailers.
- · Job site warming or break trailers.
- Job site equipment with weatherproof cab.
- In the structure in a commonly used area.
